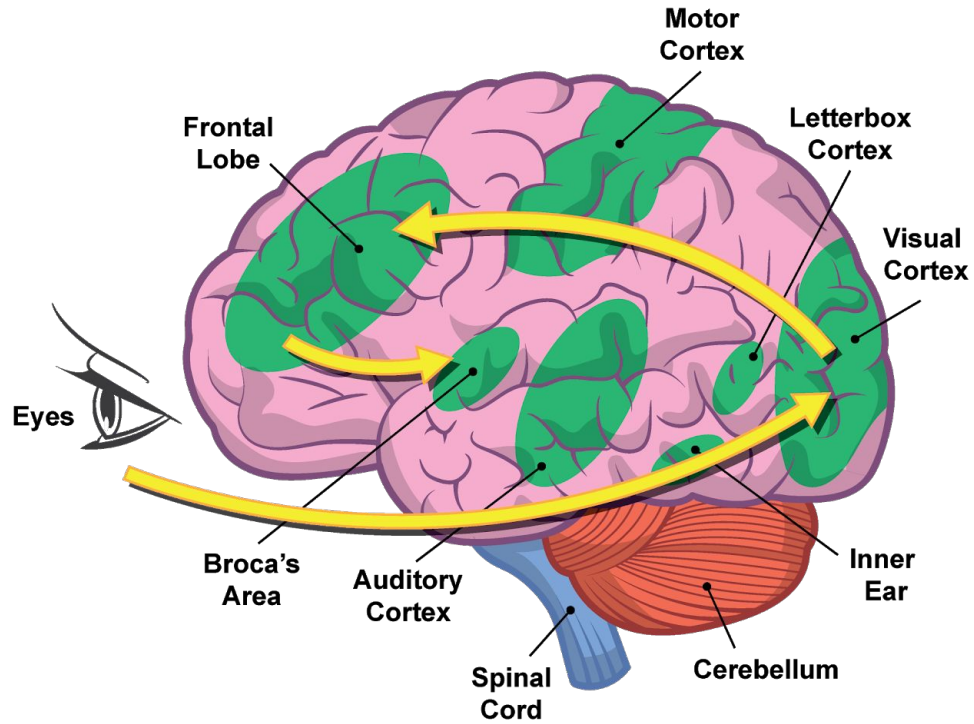
Finger tracking exercises

5-15 seconds per session

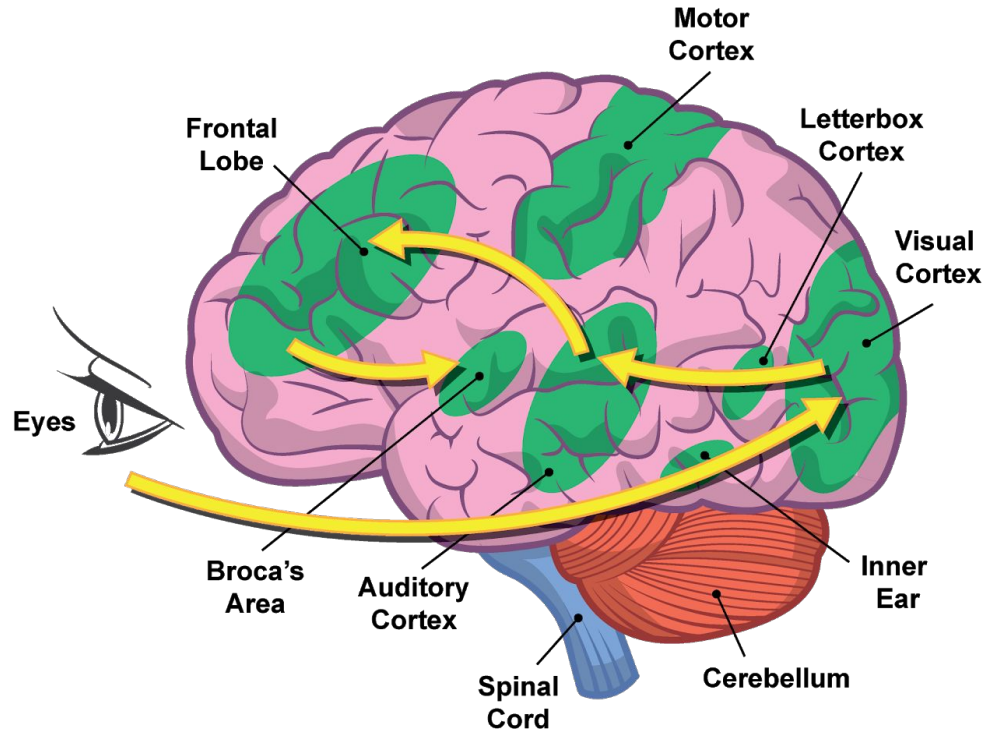
5-10 sessions per day

So, why do bright kids often show these patterns:

- 1) Guesses short words, despite reading longer words.
Plus one or more of:
- 2) Reads a word on one page but not on the next.
- 3) Switches b/d, on/no, was/saw and of/for.
- 4) Reads words correctly, but with low comprehension.
- 5) Learns spellings each week, but then forgets them.
